Safeguarding, Good Samaritans & the Second Coming Sue Whitehouse

(An edited version of the sermon on Safeguarding Sunday, November 2024)

Readings: Daniel 12, vv 1-3

Mark 13, vv 1-8 (quotations are from The Message version)

These two readings may leave you quite bewildered. (We were in the Kingdom season - the month before Advent, when we are encouraged to start thinking about Christ's Second Coming, a.k.a the end of the world.) No room here for pretty coloured lights, tinsel, or supermarket price wars over gaudily wrapped chocolates. Forget that for now. In the church's calendar there are a few more flaming hoops to jump through before you're allowed to rejoice and be merry.

But even so - the Lord has plans to save the righteous. Enter Archangel Michael - as described in Daniel "your people will be saved...every last one found written in the book". And further on in Mark 13 from this morning's passage is Jesus' promise "Stay with it to the end. You won't be sorry, you'll be saved".

Yes, great. We'll be saved if we hang in there. This is the whole point of Jesus suffering the appalling events of Holy Week and Good Friday on our behalf. We have that assurance because of his extraordinary love. BUT...what about people in our communities - including in some of our churches - for whom Holy Week and Good Friday sound like the story of their daily life? Bullied...flogged... beaten...mocked... betrayed...

Here's where we come in. Jesus commands us to love God and love our neighbour. And no, that's not the bloke next door who drills into the party wall at 8 o'clock on a Sunday morning... though we ought to try to love him as best we can! It's anyone that God sends across our path. Remember the Good Samaritan story? Who was the neighbour in that scenario? The one who kept an eye out for the bloke in trouble.

You'll have heard the word Safeguarding bandied around a lot lately, in the reports surrounding the Archbishop of Canterbury's resignation. There was a major gap in Safeguarding arrangements around a young people's Christian camp - rumours were flying around and, alas, the wrong conclusions were reached, youngsters suffered at the time and are still suffering the effects. Desperately sad.

The saddest bit from my point of view (as the person this Ministry Area now reports to with Safeguarding concerns), is that it reinforces the idea that Safeguarding is "just" about kids being sexually abused by people in authority in the Church and that sort of thing doesn't happen round here, put it on the shelf with old hymn books and forget about it.

No. Please, please don't. The potential for things to go badly wrong for children and vulnerable adults is everywhere. And it's not just about sex. Or church. Nor is it "just" about anything else - money, drugs, exploitation, trafficking. ANY kind of abuse, bullying or neglect has the potential to happen to anyone, as we're all vulnerable at some point in our lives. Kneeling at the communion rail we can sometimes be at our most vulnerable.

The point of having people responsible for Safeguarding - and enlisting the help of all of you, all of us, to keep an eye out for the bloke in trouble - is to keep the potential as potential, and not allow it to become actual. Be God's eyes and ears on earth! And to use the analogy of that infuriating slogan on the trains, "if you see something that doesn't look right, speak to... or text... We'll sort it. See it, say it, sorted". (Please feel free to text your Safeguarding officer on 07789 442 035)

But it won't get sorted unless the concern is shared. Don't be scared to have a word with me or any of the clergy - and include it in your private prayers, too. But think how you'd feel if it was you suffering the abuse,

bullying or neglect! It will only get sorted if it's shared properly, not on the bus or over a cuppa in a local cafe where half the town will overhear you.

The reason Safeguarding now has such a high profile is that we need correct information, not rumour. You heard in the St Mark reading about wars and rumours of wars. And why do we need correct information? To make EVERYBODY - you, me, him, her - able to know they're safe in the communities of the church. The slogan is "If it's not safe, it's not church".

Because what sort of people are we, if we go on about the love of God for every man, woman and child (which we know and believe in) and let something dodgy be going on in the next street or under our noses? Jesus will answer that question emphatically at His second coming. So let's keep our eyes and ears open while continuing to praise and thank Him for His love for the most vulnerable, especially at times when that's us. "Every last one found written in [his] book!"
